WORSHIP NOTES

Words for worship:

"If We Just Talk of Thoughts and Prayers" was written after the 2017 church shooting in Sutherland Springs, Texas. Author Carolyn Winfrey Gillette offers this hymn note to accompany the piece: "We are called to pay attention to what is going on in the world around us and to lift up concerns and tragedies in our prayers to God. Yet we can never let the words, 'They are in our thoughts and prayers,' be a substitute for seeking laws and policies that bring us a more just and peaceful world. As Christians, we are called to follow the way of Jesus and to work for peace, justice, nonviolence, better mental health care in our communities, and sensible gun laws, such as ones that restrict the availability of military weapons to civilians." The author has given permission to use this hymn in groups committed to ending gun violence. Prayer of Confession was written by Rev. Rachel R. Smith and was published in the God Not Guns Sabbath Worship Guide, a project of the Brady Center to Prevent Gun Violence (bradyunited.org).

Affirmation of Faith is A Companion Litany to Our Social Creed from the United Methodist Church. Our Social Creed was the first social creed, born of the church's early 20th century desire to express social principles related to the faith - at that time, the primary issue was working and living conditions of factory laborers. Since its 1908 adoption, it has been altered at various times toward current concerns, commended to the church for study and reflection, and this companion liturgy was developed for use in worship services.

Children of all ages are welcome in the sanctuary during worship. Being present is how children learn to worship, so we welcome their wiggles and whispers. However, parents of small children may also drop off their Pre-K and younger kiddos in our nursery. We also hope children will take advantage of the PrayGround, which is in the back of the sanctuary and offers room to move, color, and participate in worship in a kid friendly spot.

Assisted Listening Devices are available from our ushers for any worshiper who needs hearing assistance.
