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WORSHIP NOTES

What are the *Five Solas*, mentioned in the Unison Prayer of Brokenness? The *Five Solas* emerged during the Protestant Reformation as Latin phrases meant to summarize the Reformers' fundamental theological beliefs. The Latin word "sola" means "alone" or "only" and the *Five Solas* articulate the basic pillars of faith the Protestant Reformers believed were essential to Christian belief and practice. The Reformed faith remains rooted in these five belief statements, today.

Today is All Saints Sunday. It is a time set aside to remember and celebrate the lives of all of the saints of God, followers of Christ who are living and who have died. It is also a time when we remember the great promises of the resurrection, in which Christ conquered death forever and offered the gift of eternal life. We especially pause this Sunday to celebrate and remember the lives of the saints of this congregation who have died this past year and found their eternal rest in God: **Dixie Lynn Miller Scott** (February 20), **Marion Vaughan** (May 26), **Kathleen Clayton** (May 28), **Hughlon Walstein O'Neal** (September 8). The candles on the communion table are lit in their memory.

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Protestant worship in Germany during the 18th century centered around two elements: the sermon and the “cantata.” Musical directors, known as *kantors*, were expected to provide a different cantata each week for the Sunday service. These pieces, almost always composed for voices and instruments, were written to bring the Word to life through music. Together with the sermon (which was regularly over an hour long), the cantata was intended to teach, enlighten, and reinforce the scripture readings. Johann Sebastian Bach became *kantor* in the German town of Leipzig in 1723. Between 1723 and his death in 1750, Bach wrote over 300 different cantatas (a prodigious number, but somewhat unimpressive when compared to the 1700 cantatas written by his contemporary, Georg Phillip Telemann). It is in this tradition that the Music Ministry at Druid Hills will perform *Gott der Herr ist Sonn und Schild* as the central element in our worship this morning.

Gott der Herr ist Sonn und Schild, BWV 79, was first performed at a Reformation Festival on October 31, 1725. The readings for that day focused on remaining steadfast against the enemy (2 Thessalonians 2:3-8) and an admonition to fear and praise God (Revelation 14:6-8). While the theme of remaining steadfast against the enemy is present to a small extent in the solo movements of the cantata, the choral movements focus on praising God. The majestic opening chorus with horns, timpani, oboe, and strings features a text from Psalm 84, “God the Lord is sun and shield.” The praise of God continues in the 2nd and 3rd movements and reaches its climax in a powerful setting of the famous chorale tune *Nun Danket Alle Gott* (Now Thank We All Our God). The fourth movement is in the style of an operatic recitative and is immediately followed by a soprano and bass duet. The piece concludes with a second chorale tune where God is entreated to hold all Christians in the truth and grant them freedom so they might praise Jesus Christ.

Our opening hymn this morning, *All People That On Earth Do Dwell*, is set to the hymn tune “The Old Hundredth,” which is often sung at Druid Hills as a doxology. The British composer Ralph Vaughan Williams composed this particular arrangement for the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in Westminster Abbey on Tuesday, 2 June 1953.
